DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

2. From the Video

- Why do you think that happens, especially during fast, busy seasons like the holidays?
- Where do you most feel the pull to rush ahead instead of pausing to recognize God's faithfulness?

3. Scripture

Read Proverbs 14:12 (NIV)

"There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death."

- What are some "ways that seem right" in our culture but ultimately pull us away from God's best?
- Have you ever followed a path that seemed right at the time, but ended up leading somewhere you didn't want to be? What did you learn from it?

Preparing Our Hearts for Christmas

The Thanksgiving video reminded us that Christmas is the story of God stepping into human history — not just to comfort us, but to save us.

- What part of the Christmas story has become too familiar or "sentimental" for you?
- How can we approach this Christmas season with fresh eyes and open hearts?
- What would it look like for you to enter this season with a posture of gratitude and openness toward God's leading?
